

Dignity in the Faith

For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God to salvation for everyone who believes, for the Jew first and also for the Greek. (Romans 1:16)

Medical Corner

MENTAL AND EMOTIONAL HEALTH ADDICTION — III

Smoking is the leading cause of preventable illness. Quitting smoking is the single best thing smokers can do for their health. The long — term health benefits one gains by quitting are innumerable. Most smokers know that tobacco is bad for their health and they want to quit.

More than three-fourths of the current smokers have tried to quit at least once. Quitting smoking is tough. It takes time, planning, patience, effort and energy and a strong motivation. To start with, life may feel a bit empty, without the comforts and rituals of smoking.

There are very many ways and options to quit — counseling, smoking cessation programmes, nicotine replacement therapy and prescription medications. If one has a markedly strong will, quitting cold turkey without the help of other modes is possible. A well planned, ideal and customized combination of options greatly reduces the pain and discomfort of quitting that may prove intense during the initial few days or weeks.

The following guidelines are born out of deep concern, extended to unknown and unseen 'smoking' friends. For a smoke-free life, you have to face a tough foe, the craving for nicotine. If you falter and slip in your great effort, do not give up. Get right back on track and fight, to ultimately become a successful quitter. Do not let nicotine seduce you again.

Avoid smoking in your home. Declare your home a smoke-free zone. Throw away your ash trays. Save yourself and your family from the toxic effects of second-hand smoke. Your family and friends can play a valuable role in your new life as a non-smoker. Encouragement

from loved ones is extremely helpful. They form your biggest cheerleaders. You are taking a momentous step towards good health. Anytime is perfect to snuff out your habit. Be serious and firm in your resolve. Stay motivated and focus all your attention on quitting, giving it the highest priority. Be busy both physically and mentally all the time. Exercise more. Indulge in outdoor activities, enjoying fresh air. Every smoke-free day is a good day. As a non-smoker, declare victory over addiction and start celebrating your new life. Remember, I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" Philippians 4: 13(NKJV).

Pigeons and swallows

These pigeons infuriate me. Initially I enjoyed their antics and admired their beautifully colored feathers. But now their activities threaten to destroy our relationship. I don't mind them parading in our balcony...even pecking on the plants can be overlooked but I do have a low threshold for the mess they leave behind. And I wonder how God tolerated those swallows.

'Even the sparrow has found a home, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may lay her young— even Your altars, O Lord of hosts, my King and my God.' Psalms 84:3.

I can't imagine letting them build a nest in my home. The noise and mess involved would drive me crazy. Oh! but God isn't afraid of messes. He wades right into them. The Samaritan woman, Zacharias, the woman with chronic bleeding... What a difference between God's heart and mine. He loves people. He's concerned about the least. Even a sparrow (-hardly worth a farthing in Jewish times) gets His attention. He's okay with close proximity. He does not withhold anything. He does not turn away those who come to Him. Rejection isn't a part of His vocabulary.

Acceptance

Acceptance doesn't come easily for most of us. At least not the kind God talks about. I am happy to keep my distance with people, especially when they don't fit into my mold. But Jesus' standards surpass my measly ones. He's more often interested in my growth than my comfort. (Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God. Romans 15:7.) God wants us to accept people from all walks of life because finally it's not the bumper stickers or WhatsApp forwards that make people thirsty for Jesus. It is love. "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have

loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

John 13:34-35. (Note: Everyone will know. Shouldn't it make us want to strive to walk in love?)

Healing Ministry Kirk 200 March 2021

It was exciting and amazing to dwell on God's abundant goodness towards the Healing Ministry all through these past 200 years. The planned list for the celebration seemed exhaustive and a mammoth task. Did we bite off more than we could chew? Well ...it was the Great Physician who had put it in our hearts ... 'The One who called you is faithful and He will do it.' I Thess 5:24

It was such a great time of celebration amidst challenges like the pandemic, having only 24 hours in a day, the rebellious electronic systems, let alone the overload at work spot. Three weeks had a flood of doctors participating in the services with joy. The afterscenes were filled with excitement, adrenaline coursing through your veins, discussions, trepidation, palpitations and occasional missed heartbeats, even as the deadlines seemed to loom... oh so close!

We opened up with the release of a booklet 'Jesus The Healer'. As we all know, doctors only treat but it is God who heals. This booklet talks about the tools needed for healing The Name, The Word and The Blood of Jesus. A powerful read, it encourages one to put their faith in Jesus - the source of wisdom, who endows knowledge and skill to the medical fraternity. A Prayer Card to help people pray for healing was added to the booklet. We praise God for these tools which have been a blessing to many.

A short film 'Continuing to Care - Tracing Medical Missions in and around Madras' was screened on the second Sunday. It traced the

early beginnings of healthcare and how some of the major hospitals were established through the humble efforts of the early medical missionaries.

We were often refreshed by Dr Vimala's brownies during the recording sessions.

It ended with a Tamil song which spoke of us as the temple of God, built not on sand but on the enduring, dependable rock that is Christ Jesus.

The testimonies shared by the patients reiterated the fact of how God was working in their lives through the church and the healing ministry and how grateful we are to God for using even us.

The living testimony of Dr Vijay Anand and Dr Ann brought a tear to many an eye as we heard the transformation of the small rundown hospital of Makunda become a vibrant Hospital catering to the thousands in and around that area, with International tie ups for higher studies, Nursing School and a Nursing College in the near future.

Dr J V Peters, the Director of CMC Vellore shared about the health of the tripartite man.. the body, soul and spirit of man that is made whole in our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Hey no! that wasn't a statistics class ...it was Dr Praise Ambrose concluding the 200 Healing Ministry month of March with pie charts and bar charts, with future plans of having more organised regular clinics with a call for more doctors to pitch in at least 2 days a year.

The song 'Carry the candle, go light the world' was a blend of doctors holding a light, at their work stations and some with their armours - echoing the verse' You are the light of the world. Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven. (Matthew 5:14,16)

We wore many hats apart from that of a doctor ...content writer, video editor, poet, musician, singer songwriter commentator, photographer, director etc. and had fun.

Oh! how the Lord loves His church, His people.

He is such a gentle Shepherd who never fails,

In Hindsight

How many times do we look back at an event from our past and think, "Ah! God's timing was just perfect!"?

Giving birth to our first child in a country far from home amidst a global pandemic in 2020 certainly didn't seem like the best timing in our eyes. However, in hindsight, as I reflect on this in 2021, I see that God had a greater purpose in all the challenges he allowed in our life.

Six years ago, I developed an interest for nutrition and fitness. One of my early goals behind this was to one day be strong enough to deliver my child naturally. The interest that had started with a supposedly good intention grew to being an illusion that my life, and one day my pregnancy and labour too, was within my control, as long as I ate healthy and exercised well. I was happy with God working in every other area of my life, but when it came to my health, I was in control, or atleast I thought so.

On the 14th of June 2020, just as I had hoped, our son Yohan was born naturally. However, our God, who is the only one really in control, had a plan far bigger than I could imagine. His plan was to reveal himself to me through the very aspect that I refused to let go of, my health and ultimately my life.

An hour after my birth, the nurses and doctors found that I had excessive postpartum bleeding, tried various methods to stop it and, in being unsuccessful, rushed me to the operation theatre. I truly thought that these moments were my very last and clung to the verse that God had given me that day—"the LORD delights in those who fear him, who put their hope in his unfailing love." Psalm 147:11. I felt that this was a call for me to just trust Him through it all.

As I closed my eyes in the operation theatre, it suddenly dawned on me that I had no grasp over this fleeting life that I was trying to hold on to in my own strength all these years. I realised that God alone was in control and every day that I had was only because of His grace and not any of my own efforts.

The next morning I found that I had a complication. I do not know how serious or common a complication it was, but to me it was the most terrifying experience of my life.

What followed, while we were still in the hospital, was the news that my parents-in-law were tested positive with this very virus that the world was afraid of. With a newborn on one side and our parents sick on the other, I felt like God was putting us through a test to see if we would trust him.

Through the next couple of months we tried to figure out parenting while I battled with the fear of the pandemic around us and tried to heal from the trauma of my birth experience. I clung to the Lord like never before. There were days where I could not see the light at the end of the tunnel. All I could do was just hold on to the verse God had given me that He delights in those who fear Him and put their hope (not in the circumstances around or in what we can see) in His unfailing love

Did this verse mean that if I put my hope in Him, He would keep us all healthy and well amidst the pandemic? Certainly not. It was a call for me to let go of everything I clung to (the health and life of my newborn child and our family), place it at the foot of God's throne and rest assured that whatever He may do with it, sickness or health, was good.

Slowly but surely, as my focus started shifting from myself, and the situation around us, to God, I found peace, hope and even joy amidst these times. God had supplied our every need, and His grace was sufficient for each day. He provided for us through the caring support of our church community here in Malaysia. I found quiet but blissful moments at home, marvelling at God's creation through the growth of our child.

Through the process, in the midst of the arduous climb, I have to admit that there were many times that I couldn't see what God was doing. In hindsight, however, I see the perfect timing God had in bringing our child into this world. A timing that taught me to see that Christ's love was enough in and through every circumstance. A timing that taught me to truly learn what it means to trust and depend on God.

Our child's name is Yohan, which means God is gracious. His name and journey into this world will forever be a constant reminder to let go of all things temporal and cling to the only everlasting God, Jesus Christ, not because of what we can gain from him, but because a life lived in absolute surrender and love for Him, and Him alone, is the life we were created for.



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
