# Word from the Pastor

A few years ago my daughter and I had attended a morning service in a church nestled in the midst of mountains in California. The worship team with inspiring songs of praise held high the soaring majesty and power of our Jesus. A line in the lead singer's song touched me with a fresh revelation, "Who am I that You think of me?" It filled me with awe and gratitude that He who controls the entire universe, "upholding all things by the word of His power" (Hebrews 1:2-3) is the One who sustains the beating of my heart, the breathing of my lungs and indeed every atom of my being. Do I fully grasp the enormity of this truth that this Sovereign Almighty Creator cares for me, pouring out His sacrificial love on a wretch like me?

Giants of faith and men of God have felt greatly humbled and have asked the question "What is man, that Thou art mindful of him" (Psalm 8:4). Job has indicated clearly "Behold, I am of small account" (Job 40:4). In the 1700s, William Carey, known as the father of modern missions, considered himself a wretched sinner and a worm before his Holy God. The best of men understood that only on the footing of free grace can one approach the throne of mercy.

We Christians young and old often get complacent and comfortable in just superficially knowing our Lord. Our lives are often based on false values, relying on our puny, meagre and futile capabilities. We claim that He is "our God" and yet we seldom seek His counsel and guidance. We constantly stagger and struggle to bear our burdens ourselves. O God, forgive us! We need to burn away the worthless dross in our life and seek His grace, or else we will be building our

lives on shifting sands. We are merely empty clay jars to be filled with His holiness, mercy and love.

Let us not fall into a sad state of despair and despondency. Jesus has purchased us with His precious blood and in Christ we are a part of Him as the branch is one with the vine. Our Saviour and Redeemer will never put out the faintly burning wick nor break the bruised reeds that we are. His boundless grace will refresh and energize us to carry sunshine and diffuse happiness to all around us, all for His wonderful Name's sake.

The love of Jesus raises us up to climb the roughest mountains and to walk on the stormy seas. In joy, we are carried on His shoulder, in pain we find refuge and rest in His bosom. "Behold, I have carved you on the palm of My hands" (Isaiah 49:16) says our Lord, not just our name, but everything about us – our image, our sin, our weakness, and wants. What should we fear when we have our Shepherd King beside us as we walk through life's perplexing and dark mazes?

We too are ordinary, mundane lumps of clay with no virtue of our own till we live in close communion with our Lord Jesus Christ and soak in the rich aroma of His amazing grace. We will then be cleansed, restored and bask in the fragrance of the beautiful Rose of Sharon.

# Report on the AKCDC Project

# "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it " Proverbs 22:6

The Andrews Kirk Child Development Centre, in short known as AKCDC, was established in the year 1998 in partnership with Compassion International thanks to its pioneers, the two enterprising and visionary ladies of our Church, Mrs. Usha George and late Mrs. Ida Singh. From April 2017 onwards, it is fully funded and run by our Church with assistance from our well-wishers and cheerful givers. Located amidst the serene and placid environs of the Kirk Cemetery, the shed in SM Nagar serves as an oasis for these children who live in cramped and stuffy homes.

Our Mission is to uplift the highly vulnerable children and develop them physically, spiritually, cognitively and socio—emotionally, thereby encouraging them to be responsible and independent citizens and followers of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Biblical principles form the base and Bible teaching, imparting Christian values of integrity, discipline and self-worth are the primary objectives besides skill development.

Well, who are these children and where do they live? These are underprivileged children living in and around the slums of Sathyavani Muthu Nagar, Gandhi Nagar and Indira Gandhi Nagar, situated on the banks of river Coovum, opposite to Chennai Central Railway Station. Their Parents are poor and uneducated with little or no income. Many are single parents.

No matter where and how they live, they need to be shown Christ's love and care and so, children aged between 5 and 9 years are identified, registered and retained until they reach the age of 22 years. The children reach the project by 4:30 pm after their school

hours. After a hot cup of milk or soup, they are divided into their respective classes. The teachers, headed by the Project Manager Mrs. Anna Mary, meticulously prepare the curriculum, and help with their homework and assignments. Towards the end of the day, they have a time of prayer and Bible devotion and then break for relishing hot, nutritious dinner before departing at 8 pm. There is so much eagerness in their hearts to make use of the time and most of them are very regular in attending classes.

College going children are trained in general knowledge, spoken English, world affairs, decision making skills, music and first aid after a time of prayer and Bible devotions. Medical care, vocation training, and participation at outdoors events are part of the project. Our Asst. Pastor, Rev. Paul Anbarasu and our member, Mr. Israel are great sources of help in enriching our ministry to the college going children.

During pandemic days, the staff quickly adapted to online teaching mode. Our Pastor Rev. Isaac Johnson connected us with the Head of ECGroup Educare, Mr. Arun Isaac, who at the right time, was of immense help in coaching Maths and Business Maths for the 10<sup>th,</sup> 11<sup>th</sup> and 12th std children. Their career guidance training was attended by senior children and they found it very useful.

Today, when we see the first-generation college graduates, our hearts rejoice with thankful hearts to the Lord, the Creator of all things. This place, which was once deprived of education and childhood, has been transformed and children have found entry to arts, science, engineering and law colleges.

Periodical committee meetings are conducted to review, plan and implement best practices with Mrs Kala Dennis as the Chairperson along with the committee members.

The challenges that we contend with among the children are many – safety, health, finances, dropping out of school, bad company, laziness and child labour. Why don't you, as a child of God, prayerfully consider giving a helping hand?

# Stranger than Fiction

In the sixth and final book of J.R.R. Tolkien's epic fantasy *The Lord of the Rings*, the hobbit Samwise Gamgee wakes up to a changed world. After a long, terrible journey and desperate last stand, the central quest of the tale is finally achieved: the evil Ring and its master are utterly destroyed. As he gazes around in him in wonder, Sam finds that a dear friend, long believed dead, is in fact alive and standing before him. Torn between "bewilderment and great joy," Sam gasps, "Is everything sad going to come untrue? What's happened to the world?"

Like Sam, we may have grown accustomed to a'new normal' where ugliness, pain, and sadness seem more real than beauty and joy. As I mulled over Tolkien's words today, I thought of empty places at dinner tables; of tired doctors and nurses far away; of cancelled plans and weary hearts under the long shadow of uncertainty.

Is everything sad going to come untrue?

At present, it is much easier to believe that happy endings are unnatural, contrived, and merely fictional. 'After all, real life is tragic,' whispers my mind. 'The truly heroic person faces that bleak truth, and accepts it as inevitable.' Perhaps, as some philosophers say, the calcified layers of our cynicism will protect us from false hope — and more disappointment.

The task of a Christian, however, is to resist this "cult of the ugly," which claims that "everything beautiful is a deception." As believers in Jesus, our true and proper destiny is beauty in glory. Tolkien explains that this is why good fairy-stories console us — they offer us glimpses of "Joy beyond the walls of the world," where everything sad will indeed come untrue. Fairy tales do not shy away from tragedy or failure, but they do deny these things ultimate victory. For Tolkien, therefore, such tales are not escapist, sentimental lies, but powerful fictive truths that remind us of the deep, primary truth of the gospel:

evil cannot defeat the Good.<sup>3</sup> Storybook endings may seem strange, but scripture shows us that truth is stranger than fiction.

Consider the fascinating book of Ezekiel. As a prophet-priest in exile, Ezekiel was familiar with long years of grief and despair. He was entrusted with terrible visions. He saw the glory of the Lord depart from the desecrated temple. He saw the siege and devastation of Jerusalem. His wife, "the delight of his eyes," was also taken from him. Yet unexpected notes of hope weave in and out of his narrative, notes which ultimately swell into a triumphant finale. The concluding visions of Ezekiel describe a glorious restoration of God's kingdom and God's people.

Chapter 47 contains an episode that I find particularly beautiful. As Ezekiel is led around the restored temple, he notices a trickle of water coming from its south side. The water is initially ankle-deep, but it rises dramatically— first to Ezekiel's knees, then his waist, and then, quite suddenly, the prophet finds that "the water had risen and was deep enough to swim in — a river that no one could cross." His quide tells him a little more about this mysterious river:

This water flows toward the eastern region and goes down into the Arabah, where it enters the Dead Sea. When it empties into the sea, the salty water there becomes fresh. Swarms of living creatures will live wherever the river flows. There will be large numbers of fish, because this water flows there and makes the salt water fresh; so where the river flows everything will live.

Where the river flows everything will live — what a thrilling promise of renewal. For me, these words evoke that indescribable, inexplicable feeling that is hidden in the best myths and stories — only this time, I am not outside the narrative but within it. This time, the tale is true. Someday, the trickle of hope at my feet will engulf me as a wild river of holy joy. There will be life for death, creativity for sterility, and abundance for emptiness. Here in my exile, I am comforted; the promises of the Living Word are more extravagant than any fairytale ending.

Jesus answered, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life." (John 4:14)

# **Twenty Fingers Make Melody**

'Since Jubal stumbled upon the gamut' (as the Scriptures record the fact and Lamb phrases it) harp and organ came to birth - the string first and the percussion next - and the piano's advent was predetermined arriving in due time to bless the world. We heard Handel Manuel and Mrs. Ayyangar in a two-piano Recital at the old British Council Centre some years ago, when the twain became one musically. On 8-4-1980, at the Ball Room of the Connemara Hotel, we had the same kind of enchantment, when we heard Handel Manual and Daulet Nanava Nanavathy in a similar two-piano Receital sponsored by the Institute of Development Education, Max Mueller Bhavan and the M.M.A. The audience was not the usual highbrow Max-M.M.A. class but commendably more common being a good mixture of all those who had ears to hear and critics nurtured on recorded music. But an audience does not make the music. Twenty fingers made it presenting a most agreeable programme of Bach, Beethoven, Handel, Lizt and others for one and half hours. Their hands got into the notes as if they were gloves, with such perfect ease.

The eyes and ears of the listeners were on the stretch to mark the deftnesses that die with the moment, if left unnoticed, but make part of the felicity in piano music. Nanavaty, played with the prefect quietude of the traditional style, but was never left behind and never missed her assonances with the more expert partner, while the older musician's piano glowed red hot sometimes as he chased an arpeggio to its dizzy end or landed with poised hands and uncanny precision on the keys after he had achieved his precipitate hurry to reach some emotional close. Chords clashed with chords and rose up in harmony like 'the many twinkling smile of the sea, as the Greek pictures it, when wave buffets wave. The playing was also saturated with personality, she having all her reputation and he the remarkable self-taught musician of the world. To interpret great music one must feel with the intensity of poets. There was evidence of such feeling

in these artistes. A Beethoven piece, 'Sheep may safely graze', a pastoral lyric, might well have been called a tone poem.

Finally, when Music affirms the reality of Religion, there is hope for the world. The programme began with Rach's 'Jesu Thou Joy of Man's Desiring' and brought a Cathedral to the Ball Room, so integrating life
